We are still appealing for a concerted effort by organizations or individuals to commit funds each month in a child sponsorship program. Our most pressing need is for regular increased funding to SALAM Children's Home.

Currently the cost of keeping one child well fed, clothed and educated at SCH is 450,000 Rp per month (approx \$55.00AUD/ \$50.00 USD). The price of petrol has increased by 280% over the last 3 years, driving up the prices of just about everything, especially groceries. The cost of electricity and gas has also increased, leaving the poorest of the poor even more devastated. Food, education and medical expenses make up a huge percentage of Indonesians' annual income as compared to that of people in the west. SCH is not exempt from these costs. Prices of petrol and groceries are on the rise again now.

Please email us if you would like to have your own personal child to sponsor . You can sponsor as an individual or as a group. We will send you a child profile and he/ she will write to you. If you are interested in sharing a child we will arrange a dual sponsorship program at the cost of \$30.00 (Max two sponsors/ groups).

Immediate Needs:

More Child sponsors!

A commercial washing machine

A LARGE storage cupboard (custom made quote approx 4.5million rp)

Any Household Items and Furniture!!

Beds and mattresses are urgently needed – double/ single/ bunk beds, chairs, tables, bookshelves, cupboards, chests, even plastic storage boxes ... We have had items on loan and they have been returned as the owner is back in Bali.

Specific supplies needed

Shoe racks x 12
Guitar strings
Sporting needs: volleyball, basketball, soccer balls, badminton equipment
PCs, preferably with USB
Scientific calculators (with sin, cos, tan functions)
Indonesian/English and English/Indonesian dictionaries
Compasses
Craft glue: local "fox" or "castol" brand and PVA type glues
Scissors
Exercise books
2B pencils

Other equipment needed - second hand or new:

Office Furniture - lockable storage cupboards, a filing cabinet.

Youths' sports shoes are always an ongoing need

Towels, toilet bags, toiletries eg toothpaste, shampoo, soap, washing powder – small packets ideal

Good quality social games, preferably not language oriented.

Reading material - primarily Indonesian novels and educational.

Handy Bulk items from outside Indonesia:

First Aid/ infirmary supplies esp sterile saline, antiseptic lotions and sprays.
Multi vitamins
Cotton underwear
Quality (non waxy) crayons and pastels
Durable second hand clothes
Sheets/ bedding for beds any size

Please be aware that most new items (especially shoes, clothing, toiletries) are very easily and often more cheaply purchased within Bali

With regards to food donations please avoid highly processed foods such as instant noodles and snacks. Bulk non perishable food items are more beneficial to SCH. Eg: milk powder, dried red kidney beans, black beans, green beans (kacang hijau), oats, peanuts, rice (including black and red rice)

We work on the basis of providing enough food for 60 people ie: 10kg rice per day.

We are not only interested in money!

Any skill that can be taught is invaluable. We love to supplement the kids' formal education with a variety of creative and informative sessions particularly with a focus on empowering them to initiate their own small business ventures.
